ANTH 306 951 (6 credits) Coastal Field Archaeology

In partnership with the Huu-ay-aht First Nation, this course will introduce students to coastal field archaeology. Over six weeks, students will participate in field trips to a variety of archaeological sites; attend lectures on indigenous history, archaeological theory, paleoenvironments, and the historical ecology of the west coast of Vancouver Island; and participate in 3 weeks of fieldwork. The remaining class time will be spent in the lab analyzing archaeological samples and completing individual final projects. Students will also be responsible for writing up aspects of the archaeological work in a detailed site report, which will be shared with the Huu-ay-aht First Nation and the provincial Archaeology Branch.

FNLG 480A 001 (3 credits) Endangered Language Documentation and Revitalization

Critical study of the historical, social, cultural, political, and economic factors that impact language loss, retention, and revival. There will be a focus on research and application of methodologies for collaborative, transdisciplinary, community-based documentation and revitalization of BC's Indigenous linguistic heritage.

IHHS 408 001 (6 Credits) Topics in Aboriginal Health: Community-based Learning Experience

This course addresses the need for students to participate in interprofessional learning within an Aboriginal community setting by enabling health discipline students to gain direct experience working with Aboriginal patients and community members. By situating academic learning within an intensive four-week immersion program this course offers students a truly unique and memorable learning experience.

*This course is offered off-campus. Instructors arrange for students to live and work in an Aboriginal community for 4 weeks. Students wishing to register in this course must have submitted an application to the instructor by February 1, 2013. If you did successfully apply for this course, it will be counted towards your upper level course requirements.

MRNE 402Y 941 (3 Credits) Special topics in Marine Biology – Ethnobotany

The aim of this course is to provide students with the opportunity to learn about the relationships between people and plants, with a focus on traditional plant knowledge of Indigenous Peoples and how this knowledge reflects and is reflected by differing cultural perceptions. Major topics within the field of ethnobotany will be covered, with examples drawn in most cases from northwestern North America.

POLI 308B 951 (3 Credits) Issues in Canadian Politics – Aboriginal Politics in Canada: The Chronicles of #Idle No More

The IdleNoMore movement has shown itself to be a dynamic and powerful force mobilizing Indigenous political action. The objective of this course is to understand IdleNoMore within the context of Indigenous resistance to the Canadian state. Beginning with an examination of the contours of a settler-colonial state, the class wil look at Indigenous politics in Canada since the 1969 White Paper on Indian Policy to today.

LLED 480C 952 (3 Credits) Multimedia Technology & Indigenous Language Revitalization

Utilizing technology allows for the preservation of Indigenous languages, materials to be developed and disseminated, expands the domains in which the language is used, and provides relevance, significance and purpose. Students will learn and be exposed to various types of low-, midand high-technology initiatives that have been used to document, revitalize, promote and maintain their language. The course is designed to offer a "hands-on" experience that will contribute to a project-based outcome. Open to all who want to understand and experience how technology can support teaching, learning and revitalization of Indigenous languages.

LLED 480D 96A (3 Credits) Local and Global Perspectives on Indigeneity: Solidarity, Struggle and Possibilities in Language and Literacy Education

This course broadly examines the ways Indigenous communities have sustained and re-energized their languages, literacies, and literary practices in a time where local efforts are affected by global pressures. First-hand experiences and strategies will be shared by the instructor and guest speakers to address some of the successes and challenges that Indigenous language communities are faced with when engaging in

language revitalization efforts.
